




News and audio consumption is changing

Changing News Consumption


The <u>ACMA 'How we access news" 2023 report</u> reveals several key trends about news consumption in Australia.


- Australians used on average 3.1 different sources of news in 2023, down from 3.5 in 2022
- More Australians are choosing social media as their primary source of news content. This trend is driven by younger Australians, who are shifting away from online news websites and towards social media platforms and apps
- 20% of Australians nominated social media as their main source of news in 2023, up from 17% in 2022. Among 18–24-year-olds, 46% nominated social media as their main source of news, up from 28% in 2022
- Free-to-air television remained the most common main source of news, reported by 26% of respondents.






Creating Powerful Prompts

What makes a good text prompt

- 1. **Introduction:** the first line and a brief statement that kicks off the conversation.
- 2. **Prompt text:** the main part of the prompt and is usually a question or statement that is given to the LLM model to generate a response.
- 3. Context: Any relevant information that can help the model generate a more accurate response.
- 4. Constraints: Any specific instructions or guidelines that must be followed by the model when generating a response.
- **5. Additional instructions:** This can include style, tone, length, and other commands that help to shape the responses you receive.






6. Conclusion: the last line and is usually a brief summary statement

Once happy with the redraft I paste the new article into the voice to speech website Elevenlabs.

A had the option to use their audio player or download the audio file as an mp3.







Example 2 Creating a short form weekly podcast



Moving on to some concerning news, a mobile crane truck caught fire in the Lane Cove tunnel on Thursday 18 April 2024. The tunnel's sprinkler system controlled the blaze, which was then extinguished by Fire and Rescue NSW crews. Thankfully, there were no reported injuries, but the incident caused significant traffic delays, with cars backed up at Macquarie Park [muh-KWAH-ree PAHRK].






With this audio article or weekly podcast, you could:

- Create a weekly podcast and distribute it on Apple,
 Spotify and YouTube Music and embed on your website
 Use a podcast distribution platform like Podbean or
 Acast. Use tools like Descript to jazz it up.
- Embed the audio onto your website on the article page.
 Place the audio player near the top of the article, often under your key image.
- Partner with your local radio station and offer it for broadcast.


